Title I Explained


Title I was passed in 1965 under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). Title I is the largest federal assistance program for our nation's schools.

The purpose of Title I is to ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain high-quality education, and reach, at a minimum, proficiency on challenging state academic standards and state academic assessments.

Title I Goals

Title I aims to:

- increase academic achievement
- provide direct instructional support to scholars
- provide professional development for professors
- promote family education and involvement



Title I Funding

Title I schools receive funding from the federal government to:

- Identify students experiencing academic difficulties and provide assistance to help these students.
- Provide additional staff, programs, materials, and/or supplies.
- Conduct family engagement meetings, training, events, and/or activities.

Title I Funds at City University Schools

Title I provides additional instruction for scholars in the areas of English Language Arts and/or math by providing small group instruction and/or individualized instruction on academic skills and standards, in which they have not been able to master. This instruction, provided during general enrichment time, is additional time beyond core instruction.

At City University Schools, all scholars are provided an additional instructional period for general enrichment in math and English Language Arts.

Curriculum

City University operates on the principles of providing a valuable, well-rounded academic experience through the support of a diverse and dedicated group of qualified educators and administrative staff, an extended school year and rigorous college preparatory curriculum.



Monitoring Scholar Progress

Iready is a supplemental learning resource that helps middle school scholars master standards. Also, Iready is used as a RTI2 intervention tool.

and Progress Learning is used to help high school scholars master standards as well as the ACT.

Iready:

- Creates an individualized lesson plan for each scholar
- Monitors a scholars' progress
- Each week, Tier II and Tier III scholars must complete four lessons (two ELA lessons and two math lessons).

Assessment

Assessment helps gauge scholar performance. It identifies what scholars know, understand, can do and feel at different stages in the learning process.

Assessments will help professors better plan instruction, provide support and enrichment for scholars during the academic year.

City University will administer the following assessments this year:

- Mastery Connect- Benchmark/Tri-Weeklys
- Progress Learning
- Iready
- TNReady TCAP
- TNReady EOC

Parent's Rights


- Be involved in decisions made at both school and district level.
- Be provided with information of your child's level of achievement on tests in reading/language arts, writing, mathematics, and science.
- Request opportunities for regular meetings to express suggestions and to participate, as appropriate, in decisions about the education of your child.
- Request and receive information on the qualifications of your child's teacher.
- Be informed if your child is taught by a non-certified teacher for four or more consecutive weeks.

School Improvement Plan


